

Another very common assimilation is that of J to 3() under the influence of a preceding z(s) or d(t) ( 100, 101). 3() is intermediate in tongue-position between z(s) and j. Hence the coalition of z(s) and J naturally gives 5(), see fig. 9. 192. The tongue-position for d(t) is much the same as that for z(s), except that actual contact is made by the tip of the tongue against the upper gums. The d(t) has therefore influenced the J by drawing the front of the tongue somewhat downwards, thus changing the sound into 3(). 193....
